More than 50 percent of the student body earned first or second honors.

CTE students competed at SkillsUSA at Alfred State on March 7, showcasing what they have been learning in competitions against other CTE students throughout the region. ### Winter sports highlights

The comradery and togetherness created when a school is collectively proud of their athletics is nothing short of outstanding and there are many life lessons for students to learn through these behaviors. We are very proud of our student athletes here at Alfred-Almond and we would like to share some of our Varsity highlights from the winter season.

#### **Swimming**

The Varsity swim team began its winter break with a road trip to Churchville-Chili for sectional finals. By the end of the meet, the team would leave with numerous personal best times, many sectional champions, a perfect season and as Section V Class D champions!

Sixteen team members qualified to compete at section-

als this season. After preliminaries, 15 were able to return and ended up scoring points for the team. Every team member proved crucial.



Individual

sectional champions were Noah in the 200 freestyle and 500 freestyle and Julian in the 100 freestyle, which was the second fastest time in the history of Alfred-Almond swimming. Teaming up to win the 200 freestyle relay was Owen, Andrew, Noah and Julian, who also swam the second fastest Eagles time ever in this event. Teaming up to win the 400 free relay and seal the win for the team was Patrick, Andrew, Noah and Julian.

A team sectional championship cannot be accomplished only by a handful of swimmers and a few first places. Other crucial contributors and top scorers were Owen (2nd and 3rd), Lucian (2nd and 4th), Andrew (5th and 6th), Patrick (3rd), Jack (8th) and Quinn (8th). Finishing in the top 16 and contributing important points were Gracen, Ellora, Ella, Olivia, Henry, Matt and Joey.

To finish the day and add the exclamation point, Noah was recognized for his four sectional wins (two relays and two individual) as the 2023 Class D Swimmer of the Meet.

Congratulations to the team on a perfect 16-0 season, a county championship and a Section V Class D championship!

#### Wrestling

On February 4, the Varsity wrestling team competed at the Class B3 sectional tournament. Although not all members of the team made it through to next level, all participants gave it their all and represented Alfred-Almond well. Kanye upset last year's state representative in the semifinals at 160 lbs. In the finals, Kanye fell short of a championship, but wrestled hard to finish in second place. Hunter finished in sixth place at 172 lbs. Both wrestlers traveled to SUNY Brockport on Saturday, February 11 and competed in the Section V state qualifying tournament.

On Saturday, February 18, Alexis and Clarissa competed in the Women's Intersectional Wrestling Tournament at Chautauqua Lake High School along with 90 other female wrestlers. Having wrestled primarily male competition throughout the season, the girls were primed to wrestle against other female competitors. Clarissa, competing at the 138 lb. weight class, was able to score her first points this season. Although she did not place, Clarissa represented Alfred-Almond well. Alexis, competing at 152 lbs., started the day with a win to make it to the semifinals, where she lost to the eventual champion. Alexis won her consolation semifinal match with a reversal with one second remaining in the match to advance to the consolation final, where she would fall to finish in a very respectable fourth place.

#### **Skiing**

On February 13, the boys' Alpine ski team earned a second place finish in the Section V Class B races. Ben earned a third place overall medal in the slalom, while the runs of Jack, Nial and Talon all contributed to the runner-up finish. Congratulations to our boys' ski team on an outstanding team effort.

#### **Basketball**

The girls' Varsity basketball team season ended with a first-round loss in sectionals at Avoca-Prattsburg during winter break. The girls improved tremendously during the season and always worked hard in every practice and game. Many opposing coaches and officials complimented on the effort, improvement and sportsmanship these girls showed during the season. Regardless of the score or outcome of the games, the girls always held their heads high and walked away with a positive attitude, looking to get better each and every game. Thank you to the parents and players for their commitment this season. we look forward to the juniors returning next year and wish the four seniors best of luck in the future. ### Universal Pre-Kindergarten

A-A anticipates that the Universal Pre-Kindergarten (UPK) program for our preschool children will continue into the 2023-24 school year. Children born on or before December 1, 2019 are eligible to apply for attendance in the program. Children who are eligible to attend kindergarten are not eligible to apply for attendance in UPK.

Applications received after this date will not be considered if more than 18 applications are received. A random selection process, as required by New York State, will be performed should the district receive more applications than the 18 available openings. Families will be notified whether their child did or did not receive a spot in the UPK program with letters mailed on Monday, May 8.

Children born on or before December 1, 2018 are eligible to enter school in September 2023.


