
Sixth-graders creating and exploring

Sixth graders have been working with their air trolleys in science class. This is part of our first investigation, Variables and Design. Students build air trolleys, fly them and record how far they travel with different numbers of winds of their propellers. Then they modify the trolleys to explore independent variables and see how their changes affect the trolleys' flight distances.

Mrs. Fox's sixth grade social studies class explored the ancient caves and the humans who lived there 2.5 million years ago. Through our exploration, we learned about ancient cave drawings and what they tell us today, then we created our own cave art about ourselves. Did you know that the humans who lived during this time would use their handprints as a signature? This is because there was no written language, just drawings of what they saw. Come check our cave art out in the sixth grade hallway.

hat a whirlwind of change this school year has seen for the AACS Cafeteria! Families should be aware that universal free meals were not extended for the 2022-23 school year. If families have not yet submitted an application for free/reduced price meals, they are encouraged to do so. It does not hurt to submit an application and it is kept completely confidential. Applications are processed and results mailed back within two to three business days. Applications should be addressed to Tori Parmenter, Cafeteria Manager.

Please note that students who do qualify for free/reduced meals are eligible to receive one free breakfast AND lunch each school day.

We're pleased to share that many of the supply chain challenges we faced last year are not plaguing us as badly so far this year. We're glad we can offer a variety of options each day to all students across campus and encourage families to check out our menu on the AACS website to



College application tips for seniors

Currently, Mr. McAneney is completing interviews with each senior. These meetings take place to assist and solidify future plans. For most seniors, this is the time of year when they will begin the important task of applying to colleges. Regardless of the number of colleges to which students apply, the following process will help avoid confusion and unnecessary delays.

Step 1

When registering for the ACT or SAT, designate which colleges are to receive your score reports. Most colleges require that you send "official test scores" directly from the test center (at an additional cost).

Step 2

Complete the college application forms online. The Common Application site and the SUNY online application site are good starting places (see Mr. McAneney to find out which colleges use it). It is a good idea to make a copy of the application. Students can also download and print applications from the college website. If the application requires a teacher and/or counselor recommendation, arrange for those immediately.

Step 3

Students applying online will need a credit card number for the application fee. Students mailing their application will need to enclose a check for the appropriate amount. Do not send cash.

Step 4

An official high school transcript will need to be sent to the college from the School Counselor's Office either electronically or by mail. Students applying online through the Common Application can electronically invite their counselor and teachers to submit the necessary information. This information will be uploaded electronically by the teachers and/or Mrs. Boone. Students applying online to SUNY may print a transcript request form that needs to go to the SCO. If you would like Mrs. Boone to check your online applications before sending them electronically, please see her.

Step 5

Don't delay, act today!

Reminder: Seniors need to start their FAFSA applications at <u>fafsa.ed.gov</u> beginning <u>Oct. 1</u>.

Courses offer advantages

Ifred-Almond Central School currently offers nine Advanced Placement classes, six ACE classes, one Alfred University and two Alfred State classes taught at A-A, as well as online Alfred State and Corning Community College classes. Students who are planning to go to college should take advantage of these opportunities. Taking these classes while in high school can be a great benefit during both the college application process and undergraduate life. Below are four reasons why students should consider AP classes in high school:

1. Strengthen Your High School Transcript

Most colleges would agree that the most important part of an application is a student's academic record (transcript). Admissions offices want to see that students have participated in the most challenging courses available. Success in these courses demonstrate that a student is prepared for the next level. At A-A, the most challenging courses offered are high school college classes.

2. Develop College-Level Skills

College classes require critical thinking skills that are required of college students. The ability to write essays and problem solve successfully are just two of the skills necessary to succeed in college.

School closing information


As a reminder to families, it is sometimes necessary to
