A-A Math Team Competes

At the beginning of the 2015 school year, Mrs. Bensley, mathematics teacher, took a small of Alfred-Almond's group brightest minds to two math competitions in the surrounding area, finding great success along the way. In a competition on October 16, a team of ten students ranging from grades 8 to 12 traveled to Corning Community College (CCC) for its annual Math Day competition. The team received second place out of nine teams in the small school division. Sophomore Bill Peng came home with individual honors, receiving fourth place overall, out of over 100 students from 14 different schools. When asked how he felt about his accomplishment, Peng stayed humble, stating, "I feel alright."

"The Math Team encourages kids who enjoy math to get involved [with the team], and use creative problem solving skills," says Bensley. "It gives kids with interest an outlet to connect to other kids and figure out the things that they can do with math if they want to continue with it for a career." Competitions do not contain any subject matter higher level than Pre-Calculus, so even young participants can understand a majority of the questions given.





At the competition that was held on November 9 of this year, Juniors or Seniors receiving the top three highest test scores were eligible to receive scholarships to Alfred University, as well as a cash prize of up to \$100. The top three scorers in grade 7-10 can receive cash prizes up to \$100. At the competition, students were given 75 minutes to answer 30 challenging math questions. Hornell Humane Society in Need

The Hornell Humane Society is in need of your help. Since September, the radiating heat unit in the dog kennels at the shelter has failed and continues to fail. The piping that was installed in the 1990's has dry rotted in the concrete and is now useless. The staff tries to keep the dogs warm in the night by having heat from the office go into the kennels, but with the fast approaching winter, this will not be enough.

The new heating unit that the Humane Society would like to get is PEX, which is a crosslinked polyethylene thermosetting material that is widely used in plumbing applications. It is a flexible, durable tubing that is used for hot and cold water supply lines. This type of heating system lasts for a very long time and is very efficient. According to the Humane Society, it will cost the shelter \$30,000.

The Hornell Humane Society is part of the national and international humane society; but Hornell does not receive funds from them. All money generated for the Humane society is either from donations or fundraisers. So, this need for a new heating unit really constricts the budget for the Humane Society.



Kelly Sets Spaceflight Record

On Friday, October 16, Commander Scott Kelly set the U. S. Record for the most days spent living in space. Kelly officially broke the record for cumulative days spent living in space with a total of 383 days. Kelly is currently in space as part of the Expedition 45 crew. The astronauts in this crew are known as the "One-Year Crew." When Kelly is scheduled to return to Earth on March 3, 2016, he will have accumulated a total of 522 days living in space.

The goal of this mission is to study and provide information on how the astronauts are affected by these long-duration space flights. This new record set by Scott Kelly is important because the data that is being gathered will benefit NASA's goal of getting to Mars. For example, NASA needs to gather information on how the human body adjusts to the effects of weightlessness and radiation as well as that effects of isolation and stress of the spaceflight on the mind. There is an even greater benefit to Kelly's excessive number of days in space because he has a twin brother. Mark Kelly, Scott Kelly's twin, is helping to study all of the effects of space on his brother. Back on Earth, Mark is participating in "parallel twin studies," where the two brothers will be compared to show differences from the effects of space.



Boeing Invents 99.99% Air Metal Structure



Over the past few years, Boeing and its partner companies have been working towards creating a metal structure that is both light and strong at the same time. Their new creation will open doors to new innovations in engineering.

The new metallic microlattice is made of 99.99% air. It acts as a support for the harder outer shell, which is similar to how bones work. It's as light as a feather and is strong enough to have the potential to be used in the future of cars, airplanes, and spaceships.

You may be asking yourself, how is making this microlattice possible? Boeing has used finely tuned machinery to create it. The metal structure is made up of hollow nickelphosphorus alloys. An alloy is a metal that is made by combining two or more metals. They are then woven together to create the structure of the metal. The alloy strands are as small as 100 micrometers in diameter and the walls are 100 nanometers wide. That is about 1,000 times thinner than human hair!

Use of the microlattice in consumer environments is becoming possible with the new products. The microlattice could be used for all sorts of jobs such as creating new technologies,

shipping products, and storage!

The microlattice structure has a good practical use in shipping. In a few years, the production price may be cheap enough to produce that it could replace styrofoam. In its current state, styrofoam weighs 100 times as much as the microlattice, which would make shipping costs drastically lower.

One of the unique properties about microlattice is the ability for it to keep its shape. You can compress the microlattice into a small little clump, and it will spring back into its original shape. This characteristic opens up many new opportunities for industry. An example is in the automobile industry. They may be able to use microlattice for shock absorbers and vibration insulators.

Boeing, which was created in 1916, is the world's largest aerospace company and has made some of the biggest advancements in technology in the world. Boeing created the huge jets that you fly on when you go on vacation and even some of the U.S. Military's fighter They're jets. also expanding their horizons to include commercial space travel within the next two years. The new microlattice opens many new doors for the commercial space travel dream.

Salt & Vinegar Veggie Chips

Mist the second side of the chips with vinegar and salt and place them back in the oven to cook for an additional 10 to 15 minutes or until crispy.


