



### North Korea: What You Need to Know

If you have followed recent news, then you know that North Korea is a hot topic. It is a threatening subject that is being read about, and also actively being dealt with by governments who could be affected by it. Kim Jong Un's family has been in direct conflict with the United States since the 1950's. Nobody's quite sure how the situation will be handled in today's world, especially with a new president. Below is a timeline to help understand the longstanding conflict.

1950-1953 - Korean War rages on the peninsula between China-backed North Korea and U.S.-backed South Korea at the 38th parallel that separates the two nations. The U.S. had taken measures into its own hands, with troops commanded by General MacArthur. He led the U.S. to the border of China but was relieved due to making statements against the Truman administration's policies, which started with avoiding all out war with China. The U.S. was eventually pushed back to the original 38th parallel, where the border of the two nations still stands today.

<u>1968</u> - North Korea captures the USS Pueblo, an American intelligence gathering ship. The crew is eventually released but the ship remains in North Korean custody.

1969 - A U.S. plane is shot down by North Korea.

1994 - Jimmy Carter visits Pyongyang, the capital of North Korea, to explore whether nuclear negotiations are possible. North Korea's founder and leader, Kim Il Sung, died shortly thereafter, but a deal known as the Agreed Framework was eventually signed.

<u>1998</u> - North Korea fires missile over Japan.

**2002** - President Bush labels North Korea as part of the "Axis of Evil". James Kelly confronts Pyongyang about the existence of a uranium enrichment program (nuclear weapon program). Inspectors are kicked out and the Agreed Framework declared dead.

<u>2003</u> - North Korea withdraws from the Nuclear Non-Proliferation Treaty which is an agreement to not have nuclear weapons.

<u>2005</u> - A Six Party agreement is reached in September on disarmament, but Pyongyang stops participating after the Bush administration leaves.

**2006** - North Korea fires more missiles in July, then tests its first nuclear device in October.

**2008** - President Bush sends a letter to Kim Jong II. A cooling tower at the Yongbyon nuclear facility is blown up in front of foreign television cameras, inspectors invited back in to monitor disabling of the facility. North Korea provides documents on its program and is removed from State Department's State Sponsor of Terrorism list.

**2009** - More missiles fired as North Korea conducts second nuclear test in April. More U.N. Security Council sanctions come as a result, and North Korea pulls out of talks. In August, former President Bill Clinton visits Pyongyang to retrieve two American journalists who were detained there since March.

<u>2010</u> - In November, American nuclear experts are invited to see uranium program, which is revealed publicly for the first time. Kim Jong Il's youngest son, Kim Jong Un, is presented as the leader's choice to take power after him. North Korea sinks a South Korean naval ship, the Cheonan.

**2011** - U.S. and North Korea hold talks in New York over the summer and in Geneva in the fall, leading to what may be a breakthrough whereby U.S. food aid resumes and North Korea then halts its nuclear activities. Officials say that is sidelined for now after the news that Kim Jong II has died.

**2011**- Kim Jong II dies, sparking mass grieving in his country. His youngest son, Kim Jong Un, takes power.

**2012**- North Korea claims it has missiles that can reach the U.S. mainland. In December, North Korea successfully launches a "rocket mounted satellite" into orbit.

<u>2013</u>- Sole ally of North Korea, China, bans export to North Korea of items that could be used to make missiles or nuclear, chemical, and biological weapons.



**2014**- North Korea and U.S. exchange accusations of cyber-attacks over Sony Pictures film "The Interview" mocking Kim Jong Un, prompting new U.S. sanctions the following month.

<u>2015</u>- U.S. imposes brand new sanctions on North Korea, targeting the country's banks and shipping companies.

<u>2016</u>- January - North Korean government's announcement of first hydrogen bomb test met with widespread skepticism.

**2016**- November - U.N. Security Council further tightens sanctions by aiming to cut one of North Korea's main exports, coal, by 60 per cent.

**2017**- January - Kim Jong-un says North Korea is in the final stages of developing long-range guided missiles capable of carrying nuclear warheads.

**2017**- February - Kim Jong-un's estranged half-brother, Kim Jong-nam, is killed by a highly toxic nerve agent in Malaysia, with investigators suspecting North Korean involvement.

**2017**- April- Donald Trump sends armada towards Korean peninsula to show strength. North Korea threatens to fire upon U.S. vessels. Congress meets at the White House to be briefed on the full situation.

U.S. tensions with North Korea at the moment are at a considerable high. What this could lead to is unknown, and many skeptics are nervous. Could this go nuclear? Could it lead to further war with China or Russia? Could a full out war call for a draft? Kim Jong Un is an indecisive figure, so we need to be careful. For all of the American people, hopefully a

diplomatic solution can be found.



### Russia's New "Ground Breaking" Bomb

Earlier this April, a Russian missile manufacturer, Sarmat, released the first image of their **RS-28** ballistic missile intercontinental nicknamed "Satan 2." Satan 2 is a missile that is capable of wiping out both the Kingdom United and France simultaneously an area roughly the size of Texas. It also has a range of 11,000 kilometers (6,835 miles), weighs 100 tons, and can reach many parts of the world from most Russian bases with no problem. This highly advanced missile makes the nuclear bombs used on Japan during World War II look like tin cans. The Satan 2 missile can hold ten larger warheads (the explosive or toxic material that is delivered by a missile) or sixteen smaller warheads. It can also evade all radar defenses and reach the East Coast of the United States.

Russia's recent actions with its growing military and its nuclear weapons programs has caused NATO's and Russia's neighboring countries' concerns to rise, causing them to heighten defences and worry about Moscow's military in April, Russia direction. Earlier suspended an arms reduction agreement with the United States. The agreement stated that both countries had to dispose of 34 tons of plutonium. That's enough plutonium for 1,000 standard nuclear bombs. The United States plans on retaliating with the Ordnance Air Blast bomb, or MOAB (Mother of all Bombs), which is the largest non-nuclear bomb used to date. And as tensions rise with North Korea, the thought of these weapons being used is becoming a much more real problem.

- Spoken in South Africa
- It is pronounced through clicks made with the tongue and throat.

#### Yoron:

- Approximately 950 speakers in 2004
- Spoken in Yoronjima, a tiny island south of Japan
- It is essentially a Japanese dialect, but classified as its own language. It is a sub-branch of the Japonic Language Family.

#### Pirahã:

- Approximately 300 speakers as of 2009
- Spoken in Amazonas, Brazil
- The Pirahã language is one of the simplest languages phonologically.

Have you ever wondered who puts on some of the various events around the school? SIT. The Secondary School Improvement Team (SIT) is a collaborative group of faculty, students, and community members. The purpose of SIT is to bring engaging and educational experiences to the students and community of Alfred-Almond by addressing goals and maintaining a positive school culture. SIT meets monthly (on Wednesdays after school) discuss upcoming events opportunities. The committee created in January of 1994 as a way to compliant with the NYSED Commissioner's Regulations that stated that "each public school district board of education ... shall develop and adopt a district plan for the participation by and with teachers parents administrators and school board members in school-based planning and shared decisionmaking."

Many of the events that happen at the school are organized and run by the SIT; some of these events include: the first honors breakfast, open house, the Strawberry Festival Concert, and International Night. The committee also puts together the drunk driving accident simulation and the seminar on drug and alcohol abuse with the purpose to give students the resources they need to be able to make informed decisions and wise choices.

One more recent goal of the SIT committee is to promote diversity. International Night, held in January of 2016, was an event that did just that. Though there is some diversity near us, area immediately surrounding Alfred-Almond is not as diverse as some major metropolitan areas, and students and many community members are not exposed to differing cultures. International Night was an event that informed the community of different aspects of individual cultures that hold influence in the families around us as well as the world. France, Scandinavia, Ethiopia. Italy, Mexico were some of the countries with displays that included food, photos, music, currency, and much more. Be on the lookout next year

Another thing that the SIT committee did this year to promote diversity was "Leave Your Mark." 
their all into helping students develop important life skills, then I don't know what does!






### **WHAT IS MORP?**

Sphynx: The Sphynx is a hairless cat that originated in Europe. Starting in the mid 1900s, breeders were beginning selective breeding to achieve a hairless cat. Since Sphynx are almost completely hairless, they are fairly good for people who want a cat but are allergic to cat hair or cat dander. The texture of their skin is like that of goat or sheep skin, due to the very fine hairs on their bodies. They do not always have whiskers due to the genetics that make the cat hairless in the first place. The color of their skin replicates what their fur would look like, with typical cat markings. Savannah: The Savannah cat originated in the United States, and is a cross breed between a Siamese domestic cat and a Serval (medium sized, African wild cat). The cross breed became popular in the 1990s, and in 2001 the Savannah became accepted as a new breed by The International Cat Association (TICA). Later in May of 2012, the Savannah was a championship breed. Savannahs are tall and slim, which gives them an appearance of being bigger than they actually are. Their size is dependent upon their sex and their generation. When a Serval and a domestic cat breed and have kittens, those kittens are an F1 generation, so for example the grandchildren of the F1 Savannahs would be F3 Savannahs. The largest are typically the F1 males, which are the children of the original crossing between the Serval and the domestic cat. The Savannah normally has a spotted pattern, which is the only pattern accepted by the TICA breed standards. The non-standard

patterns and colors include: rosetted, marbled, snow, blue, cinnamon, chocolate, lilac, and other watered down colors from the domestic sources. Savannah cats are often compared to dogs in their loyalty to their owners and their tendency to follow owners around the house. They can even be trained to fetch and walk on a leash. They are very social cats and most are friendly to new people and other cats and dogs. Some might not be very friendly to strangers, though, and may run away and hide or even hiss when seeing an unfamiliar face. Due to the Savannah cats' size, they are known for their incredible jumping abilities, reaching heights up to about 8 feet from a standing position. They are very curious cats, and can learn how to open cupboards and doors. Most Savannahs don't fear water; in fact, they love to play in water and sometimes submerge themselves in it. They will even get into the shower with their owners, like Bengals. The generation can play a role in whether they chirp or meow. The older generations tend to chirp more, and the younger generations tend to meow more. I would love to have a Savannah cat one day.

When Bret Saberhagen was being announced, and the dining room heard he was a former Boston Red Sox, he was actually booed, which led to ironic cheers when he was announced as a New York Mets player. There was a small salad for a starter, then followed stuffed chicken with a side of mashed potatoes and corn followed as main course. A slice of white cake with pink frosting and red sprinkles was dessert. A rather large raffle followed dinner that was full of sports items liked signed baseballs and pictures. Mr. Mac, who was attending with Mr. Turner, won a baseball signed by eight time All-Star Darryl Strawberry. An auction followed where a couple thousand dollars were spent on autographed sports items. All of the celebrity guests gave speeches after the auction, and they were brief and to the point. Bruce's speech was the one that stuck with me the most. **Bruce Smith** played in the National Football League for 19 seasons. He was a member of 11 pro bowls and named to nine pro bowl teams. He was defensive player of the year in 1990 and 1996. He is a member of the 1980s' and 1990s' "Team of the Decade." He was known for being a member of the Buffalo Bills team that lost four consecutive Super Bowls. He holds the current record for most career sacks (tackles on the quarterback) at 200, and had 13 seasons of double digits in the sack column. He was taken first overall by the Buffalo Bills from Virginia Tech in the 1985 NFL Draft. He was voted into the NFL Hall Of Fame as soon as he was eligible in 2009.

Bret Saberhagen was taken as 479th in the 19th round of the 1982 Major League Baseball Draft. He made his MLB debut for the Kansas City Royals on April 4, 1984. He played for the Royals for seven seasons, winning the American League Cy Young Award in 1985 and 1989. In 1985 along with his Cy Young win he was a member of the Royals World Series winning team and was named the MVP of the championship series. In 1989 he was the American League leader in ERA (Earned Run Average) and the MLB leader in wins. He won his only Golden Glove Award that season. A Golden Glove is given to the best fielding player in each position. In his final season as a Royal he pitched a no hitter against the Chicago White Sox. He is the last player to date to throw a no hitter for the Royals. After the Royals, he spent four seasons with the New York Mets, one season with the Colorado Rockies, and four with the Boston Red Sox. His last game was August 7, 2001. He was a three time All-Star over his career. He is now a member of the Kansas City Royals Hall of Fame.
