If you have tuned into the news recently you have probably something heard about Caravan, which began to reach the border in mid-November. This is a group at the Southern United border which States predominantly Honduran, along with individuals from Guatemala and El Salvador. According to BBC.com, these people seeking asylum due to gang violence, drug wars, and government corruption. Caravan members also cite fleeing persecution, poverty, and violence as reasons for leaving their homes.

President Trump responded to the Caravan on twitter by calling it an "invasion" and told the asylum seekers that "our military is waiting for you." On the subject of whom is truly in the Caravan, President Trump made the statement that, "many gang members and some very bad people are mixed into the caravan heading to our Southern Border." ABC published an article showing the migrants response to this statement. These people told ABC that most are not violent criminals, and that "Everybody wants freedom".

The BBC reports that there are roughly 7,000 people at the border, and there are predicted to be 10,000 migrants that reach the Southern United States border in total.

Furthermore, there have been 5,800 troops deployed to manage the situation, and the United States Department of

Homeland Security briefly closed the border entry point at San Ysidro due to the large influx of people.

Mexican Officials have released some statistics to CNN in regards to the caravan. They have reported that there are 2,500 in temporary shelters in Tijuana and an additional 600 in other kinds of shelters in Tijuana. There were 300 individuals in a temporary shelter closed in response to health concerns. Mexican officials claim that 1,100 of the caravan members "could have crossed into the United States" while another 1,100 have voluntarily agreed to return to Central America with assistance from the International Organization for Migration. It has also been reported that 70% of the caravan is male, and the largest age group is between 18 and 28.

CNN reports that on December 8, a seven year old girl, Jakelin, died while in the custody of border patrol agents. According to USA Today, the young girl was taken into custody after crossing the border illegally with her father. She is said to have died from dehydration and shock 8 hours after being taken in.

Jakelin was taken to El Paso Hospital after she began having seizures. The United States Department of Homeland Security released a statement saying that the girl had not "eaten or consumed water in several days," yet the

Washington Post published a statement from Jakelin's father saying that she entered custody in good health. The Department of Homeland Security offers its sincerest condolences in response to the death of Jakelin.

It is no secret that the situation on the border has created an extreme level of hostility. One specific example is the tear gassing of migrants in response to their violent actions as reported by the Washington Post. When a "lobbed group of migrants weapons" over the border and hit border patrol officials, the United States retaliated by tear gassing the migrants. Caravan member Milla described Cindy the situation with the statement, "I felt that my face was burning, and my baby fainted. I ran for my life and that of my children." The tear gas that was used by the United States, also known as CS gas (short for Corson Stoughton), is outlawed on the battlefield by many countries including the United States. This CS gas was banned due to the fact that it is "uniquely terrorizing in (its) application". President Trump described the act as a "tremendous to response violence", while the Washington Post cited it as an "unusual The President also escalation". released the statement that, "three Border Patrol people yesterday were very badly hurt through getting hit with rocks and stones." Customs and Border Protection Commissioner Kevin McAleenan said that 4 of his agents were struck by rocks, "but were wearing protective gear and did not suffer serious injuries."

Some of the asylum seekers have stopped waiting to cross the border legally, and have started to take illegal steps to gain entry into the United States. According to PRI,

about two dozen individuals climbed a portion of the fence in Tijuana that stands 10 feet tall. Another three people squeezed through the fence, instead of attempting to climb over. More migrants followed, many bringing children with them. Once were with the United States borders, some ran while others simply turned themselves in to authorities. PRI explains that applying for asylum can take months, so if migrants enter illegally and turn themselves over to authorities, their case has the possibility to be heard sooner. This sense of urgency may be attributed to the fact that United States officials have slowed applications at the Chaparral Gate in Tijuana, Mexico to 40 to 100 applicants per day.

No matter your view on this issue, there is much to be done to help the situation. December 10 to 18 was a week of action The American Friends Service Committee shows that the slogan for the week is "Love knows no borders: A moral call for justice." Over this week there were demonstrations in many cities at the Southern border. If you are interested in donating to help those waiting for entry, you can consider the ACLU, RAICES, the Texas Civil Rights Project, and The Florence Project. Finally, one way that you can help the situation is to stay informed on the issue and continue following it long after this article is published.



Beauty and the Beast : A Preview

In the countdown to the last few weeks of school before Christmas break, flyers were seen on the walls of Alfred Almond announcing the dates of auditions for the school's musical. This year's show is the childhood classic, "Beauty and the Beast." Conversation arose among students, discussing the potential candidates. To find out more about the musical, I talked to the director herself, Ms. Lisa Karr.

Since there have been a variety of shows over the years, I felt inclined to ask why this one was chosen. "Mr. Bialecki has wanted to do this musical for a long time. I love it because I have been a part of it..." she explained, "It felt like it fit Alfred Almond students right now." Her other choice was "Seven Brides for Seven Brothers," but she wasn't sure if enough people (especially boys) would audition for it.

A clockmaker is captured by the beast, the daughter takes his place, and the two later fall in love. In the school musical version however, there are some notable differences.

Ms. Karr said, "There are some new songs that are not in that one... Maurice, the father, has a duet with Belle... Belle and the Beast have songs that are not in the original as well." She also went on to tell me that several characters have bigger parts in the show, too. One she mentioned specifically is the Wardrobe, which is the character she played as when she participated in the show in the past.



Having the knowledge of what's different in the musical, I wondered what Ms. Karr was looking for while casting characters. Auditions are a time everybody where comes perform their song of choice and read the script provided, along with other people in a group. After that, a callback list is posted in the hallways of the school. There, Ms. Karr narrows down the lead roles. She explained, "Callbacks are a really good time to see chemistry on stage. Which characters are believable, not only in that particular role, but with the love story between Belle and the Beast? Who would be believable on stage?"

To wrap things up, I wanted to know, as a director, what her goals are for the musical this year. She answered simply with, "My goal is always to have the best one yet." More specifically, she said she wanted a show that the audience loves. She wants people who don't have a family member involved in the musical to still be interested in watching.

"Who reads?", asked a bright but temporarily cynical student one day, when I had the bad manners to mention a book. My answer was immediate and did not require deep reflection:

"Anyone who wants to know about himself, other people, and the whole wide world we inhabit!"

Leaving aside the topic of assigned reading for work or school, personal reading is the most direct and practical way to discover more about our true selves and live our lives more fully.

Alfred-Almond Central School is committed to encouraging and enhancing the personal literacy of every person in the district and, with that district initiative in mind, I will now suggest a list of "rules" you might apply to your own reading life. They are listed in no particular order of importance; feel free to add your own or totally ignore any or all of them if you don't find them helpful!

Unofficial Rules of Reading

- 1. Read anything you truly enjoy: comic books, graphic novels, hot rod magazines, love stories-anything which encourages you to read more (and eventually read better)!

In the end, when it comes to your personal reading, you and only you can make and break the rules. It is your (inner) life and you are in charge! But remember that reading is a form of "mental breathing." Don't hold your breath too often or for too long!







Yale educator Robert Hutchins believed that the purpose of education wasn't to "reform students, amuse them, or to make them expert technicians." Rather, its purpose served to "unsettle their minds, inflame their intellects, [and] teach them to think straight, if possible." These are the true intentions great teachers want to aspire for their students. While she did not mention this to me directly, this is one of the many truths about education I took from interview away my student-teacher Miss Julie Mulryan, whom you may have seen in the classroom teaching with Mr. Decker. Through this interview, I was able to appreciate the long journey that prospective educators have to go through to become a certified teacher in high schools.

Prior to teaching, Miss Mulryan initially chose engineering as her major at Alfred University. A summer internship in the engineering field convinced Miss Mulryan to pursue her real passions - teaching and math. As of now, Miss Mulryan has just graduated this past December with a mathematics major, and a minor in adolescent education at AU. To complete her education minor, Miss Mulryan had to take numerous classes specific to adolescent learning such as Current Teaching Methods, Literacy in the Content Area, Special Education, Seminar



In Student Teaching, and much more. She has finished all her required exams for NYS teaching including the Educating All Students Test, the Mathematics Content Specialty Test, and is currently in the process of submitting her EdTPA (Educative Teacher Performance Assessment) portfolio after she graduates college.

Her final step as a prospective teacher is to apply for an

Initial Certificate and a New York math teaching certificate through the TEACH System where the New York Department of Education will review her teaching assessment and credentials. During the next five years, Miss Mulryan will have to meet the requirement of 175 hours of professional development activity in order to attain a professional certificate. After this laborious process, Miss Mulryan will be qualified to begin her teaching career.

In the distant future, Miss Mulryan envisions herself teaching younger students from either middle school or high school. Someday, she says she might teach geometry, trigonometry, algebra, or calculus to her students (or all of them at some point). When planning classroom activities, Miss Mulryan intends to add variety to her math lessons with group activities, fun games, and traditional worksheets. "Not every lesson can be exciting," she says, "but I always try to keep my students involved and engaged in the classroom." To motivate students further, Miss Mulryan stressed the value of student-teacher relationships and getting invested in students' lives outside of the classroom setting



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I value the times that I get to really know and interact with my students on a <u>deeper level</u>. When students know they are cared for and valued, they are much more likely to <u>engage and learn</u> in the classroom.

While teaching her lessons, Miss Mulryan also wants to "find ways to make the material relevant with real-life examples so students can see where their knowledge can be applied" outside of class. Miss Mulryan's Understanding insightful views on educational values have led me to believe that she will someday become an inspiring role model to many young students whom many of which would look up to.

While Miss Mulryan's student teaching only lasted several months between Wellsville and Alfred-Almond, Mr. Decker had imparted her with crucial advice and knowledge on how to teach mathematics effectively. One of the several problems she ran into with her training was adjusting to the one-hour block system Alfred-Almond. Sometimes, she would run out of time covering parts of her lessons, but Mr. Decker has made some suggestions that really helped her with time management and behavioral skills. Going beyond teaching, Mr. Decker has taught Miss Mulryan the "importance of caring for each of his students". Miss Mulryan notably remarked that her mentor "takes the time to talk to every



student throughout the day. When you see him in the hall, he says hello to every student and knows all of their names." Mr. Decker's actions have inspired his student teacher to seek out the deeper connections among students through day-to-day interactions and genuine compassion.

"I strive to be as <u>kind and caring</u> of a teacher as Mr. Decker."

Looking back Miss Mulryan's path to becoming a teacher, I can say that without a doubt, she will become a great teacher for many students years to come. While many prospects go through the usual qualifications needed to teach, it's really the great teachers that have the capacity to innovate, inspire, and uplift their students in the classroom. It's through this interview I learned that teaching is a humanistic profession and not a technical one meaning that it requires the teacher to be open and accessible for their students. In Miss Mulryan's case, I can already see some of the true qualities that Robert Hutchins aforementioned.


Mentality

Lab Tests- Doctors may want to conduct a complete blood count

Psychological Evaluation-Doctors may ask questions or ask you to fill out a questionnaire

Treatments

<u>Light Therapy</u>-exposes you to a bright light that mimics the sun and is a natural way to boost serotonin Antidepressants- can be prescribed by a doctor *Use these treatments with caution (can potentially cause manic episodes)*



Use these tips to occupy your time and steer clear of SAD.





Dr. He Jiankui: mad scientist or brave leader?

Monday November 26. Science Conference, Dr. He Jiankui announced both the birth of and his involvement in the creation of the first genetically edited children. These artificial twin girls were born healthy in the state of China, and their genes were edited to be immune to major diseases such as AIDS and HIV. While the scientific community has been in outrage since announcement, Dr. He stated in an interview with The Associated Press that he is proud of his achievements. He is quoted as saying, "I feel a strong responsibility that it's not just to make a first, but also make it an example," and finished with "Society will decide what to do next."

The twin girls were created by using a fertilized embryo from the DNA of a wealthy couple that was having trouble with pregnancy. Dr. He was able to use a tool called Crispr-Cas9 to edit and splice the DNA of the embryos before their development into a fetus. The people closely involved with the operation see Dr. He as a hometown hero, while others are not so impressed with his ability to 'play God'.



Shoukhrat Mitalipov, director of the Center for Embryonic Cell and Gene Therapy at Oregon Health and Science University is one of He's biggest critics. Speaking on the incident he said, "I think that's completely insane," Mitalipov is a leading researcher in the field who broke ground when he successfully removed dangerous genes from a human embryo. He is not alone in the criticism of the twin girls, however. 122 Chinese scientists have grouped together calling He's actions both "Crazy," and "a huge blow to the global reputation and development of Chinese science."

The genetic editing of a human baby is like a controversial moon landing, "one giant leap for mankind." It was decided by the National Scientific Board that genetic editing would be banned on humans in the US. the same decision was reached in a countless number of other countries. China is an exception to this ruling, so Dr. He did not technically break any rules with his actions. Artificial humans are still a mob fear and is unsettling to know that these twins are the beginning of something new and very big.

While the United States Board of Science claims 'designer babies' are not coming any time soon, Dr. He begs to differ saying that with his tools and knowledge, he could make one tomorrow...

The idea of gene editing is exciting, more than designer babies is on the horizon for this topic of science! Crops never before seen in nature, cures to diseases like cancer, and even extending human life expectancy by unnatural amounts. "I, (name) do swear, that I will support the Constitution of the United States and of this State, so long as I shall continue to be a citizen thereof. So help me God. I (name) do swear, that I will faithfully discharge, to the best of my abilities, the duties incumbent on me as (office) according to the Constitution and laws of the State. So help me God."

This is the official oath of office all Maine elected politicians must repeat in order to be officiated. State senate president Troy Jackson comes to the podium and proclaims "It's oath time." The crowd goes wild over something I am quite humble about. Janet Mills calmly puts her hand on a bible held by grandkids Wyatt and Hayden and niece Julia. Jackson asks Mills "Are you ready to take the oath?" The governor-elect simply answers. "Yes." Then Jackson reads the oath of office, in which Mills confidently repeats each sentence

Maine Secretary of State Matt Dunlap officially announces with a powerful voice that the results were certified. Janet Mills takes the stage and thanks all of the guests and her thousands of Facebook friends specifically. While her speech hinted at her political motivation, I thought it was special and rare that no names were used negatively and biasedly. Sometimes,

use humor, for example, when guests expected Janet to make note of the fact she was the first governor to be elected as a woman, she firstly noted that she was the first governor from the rural Franklin County.

Janet talked about mainstream issues of Maine including the opioid epidemic, drug healthcare access, infrastructure and the economy and climate change. She recalled that at the beginning of the millenium, she made a list of things that would be obsolete in 50 years and a list of things that would stay, including cash money and Stephen King novels respectively, in which she thought the future is the present by telling Maine she would establish the "Department of Innovation and the Future," which would create good economic conditions and educated people. She talked about the education system and that she would put a sign at I-95 on the Kittery state line that said "Welcome Home," the title of her speech.

Before the speech, a precise order of the inauguration occurs. It is actually called to order as a joint session of the house and senate, of which a committee is created to swear in the governor. When Mills agreed, the Mount Blue High School Band, the Franklin County fiddlers, and two African elementary kids that moved to

Portland from Namibia and Angola and are part of the Maine Boys and Girls Club sang a duet of Alicia Keys "This Girl is on Fire". After the concerts, local poet Wesley McNair, the former state poet laureate read his official play. Then a black pastor, Wabanaki Native and a female Jewish rabbi preached to the crowd about the future. The diversity and unity of the Maine people are one of Mills biggest campaign motivation. After the swearing in and speech, a benediction by a Catholic priest ended the session of congress and the congress left.

This is a first hand account of experience taking proactive part in a civic procedure. The city of Augusta had thousands of visitors from across the world. While it is a public event, security was very good at the event. The people that help out: the janitors, the ushers, the ticket salespeople, the speakers, even the master of ceremonies. the parking attendants you name it, were all working together to make the public event run smoothly. Many high profile Maine politicians were in one open theater and building. It was a and there success were technical or essentially no logistical difficulties.

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Two days later, I arrived back in Augusta at the Civic Center to participate in the inaugural ball. While most male patrons had the attire of a black suit and white dress shirt, I wrote "Me do Me", which means I arrived in a green color dress suit with a vest and black pants and a hat, more flashy looking sophisticated. As soon as I found people I knew, Janet's grandchildren and their friends. which were essentially the only peers there, I stuck with them. I then followed them innocently to the "VIP room" where Mills had a private room to herself. I actually was able to gain access every time I entered the room. There was private food that was good, and couches, in which Janet introduced people. I recall her noting to someone that I was a rapper, which was interesting to say the least.

The ball lasted for 5 hours essentially, however the last band was actually decent. I had coins, so I dropped them in the band water cups as a tip because they were actually singing good songs like "Love Shack", "Come on Eileen" and " I Want you Back" and we then went to the hotel. I truly believe that my coincidental experience knowing Mills and even earlier, when I paged in the Senate and House, went to parties with Maine Politicians and seen a political icons personal side, impacted me in a positive way and in a way not many people impacted have been in. Politicians are

humans too.. I can recall when as attorney general, Mills commuted 30 minutes to work everyday in a modest vehicle and raised a family. Her husband Stan died in 2014 due to the effects of a stroke and she has five stepdaughters. Growing up in Farmington with two brothers and two sisters herself, she has always had a big family and she is quite close with them too. When I stayed, many family members were up in town for the inauguration. Her siblings are political as well. Her brother Peter was a state senator and director of the Maine Turnpike. Her sister was the head the Maine department of Health and Human Services. Her brother Paul is a lawyer and town historian of the Farmington Knowing someone on a personal level who is extremely notable or.

famous person whether that person is a politician like Mills, an athlete like Seth Wescott or an entertainer like myself is not a difficult thing to do. While some people purposely look for friendship with someone with a "Wikipedia Page" or television appearance, I met Mills coincidentally, and unlike other governors, I have the ability to keep in touch with her or her family in case I want to visit Maine again.

It was simply a pleasure to visit the state of Maine for the holidays to enjoy the cold winter and have the possibility to be politically active throughout the fortnight of Christmas break. It is vitally important to be politically active and have many people that are on your side.


