Music 7 December 2017



Mueller 10 December 2017

The Path to Justice

On October 30, 2017, Special Counsel Robert Mueller indicted two top former Trump campaign officials on 12 counts, according to Politico.com. Indictment is a formal accusation that a person has committed a crime, and the recent indictments of Paul Manafort and Rick Gates has left the nation shaken. Both Manafort and Gates' charges included conspiracy against the United States and money laundering. They have pleaded not guilty to all charges.

According to Fortune.com, Mueller was appointed as special counsel on May 17 after the director of the FBI, James Comey, was fired. Comey was investigating the Trump campaign after allegations came out about Russian collusion. Collusion, as defined by Merriam-Webster, is a secret agreement or cooperation, especially for an illegal purpose. Mueller was a director of the FBI from 2001 to 2013. Both Democrats and Republicans thoroughly supported the appointment of Mueller, according to the New York Times.

Despite the fact that Mueller was appointed to investigate the links between the Trump presidential campaign and the Russian government, neither Manafort's nor Gates' indictments mentioned collusion. However, according to the indictment, both worked for the Ukrainian government, and received payment from said government, without letting the Attorney General know. Manafort and Gates also attempted to hide the money they earned by using offshore accounts, and then transferred the money into the United States.

Manafort and Gates were not the only people who were indicted. According to Fortune.com, George Papadopoulos, Trump's foreign policy advisor during his campaign, had pleaded guilty in July to lying to the FBI. The incident happened during an interview in January of 2017. As reported by the New York Times, Papadopoulos had conversations with a Russian professor who he claimed was "a nothing," but now acknowledges had close ties to the Russian government. Papadopoulos also lied about when he began communicating with the professor. In the interview he stated that the professor was communicating with him before he began working on the campaign; Papadopoulos has now admitted that communications began after his employment on the Trump campaign started. Papadopoulos has since been cooperating with investigators who are now questioning aides within the White House. UPDATE (12/1/17): On December 1, 2017 Michael Flynn, Trump's former National Security Advisor was indicted for lying to the FBI about conversation he had with the Russian ambassador reports the New York Times. He pleaded guilty

All About Downhill Skiing

Downhill skiing, or alpine skiing, is a sport in which you slide down a snow-covered hill on skis. The skis have fixed-heel bindings to attach to your ski boots. While racing, skiers wear helmets and giant slalom suits (skin tight suits for less wind resistance), but they stay warm with many layers of clothing when they are not racing. The speed of your descent downhill can be controlled by changing the angle of your skis or skiing across the hill instead of down it. The assistance of a ski lift or a gondola is needed in order to get to the top of the hill, since the ski equipment worn makes it nearly impossible for the skiers to efficiently hike up the hill on their own. The sport is typically practiced at ski resorts; our ski team at Alfred-Almond attends Swain most days for practices and meets. Ski resorts provide ski lifts, first aid, resturants, and artificial snowmaking.











What Happens In a Typical Ski Meet?

When I asked Duncan, senior classmate and member of the ski team, this is what he had to say: "We get to Swain, then we change into our ski clothes, and after that we take two or three warm-up runs down the hill before we race. Afterwards we head over to the race room where there is usually food; after we eat we go up to the top of the hill and watch the modified race. Then the boy skiers carry the girls' jackets to the bottom of the hill while the girls race so they have their jackets when they're done - this is a tradition. The boys go back up and do their race. After they have each finished their first race, the girls and boys both race again. Finally we head home on the schoolbus."

I set out to find the most interesting traditions and celebrations that happen during the winter holidays, and found that there are 160 countries that celebrate Christmas. A typical Christmas in Austria is atypical in comparison to the United States. Larissa, a former foreign exchange student of Alfred-Almond, had a conversation with me about how different Christmas is in her home

This is also the case in the United States. Austrians "don't typically celebrate Thanksgiving, so people start to prepare for Christmas in mid-November," described Larissa. Christmas markets around the country open, and huge Christmas trees are put in public places. Larissa commented that "cute lights are hung around the city, but Austrians don't decorate the outside or inside of their houses for Christmas." She believes that "Americans overdo decorations." Christmas in Austria is not celebrated on the 25th as it is in the United States Instead. Austrians celebrate on the 24th of December. Austrians eat many different foods during the holidays such as gingerbread, Vanillekipferl, Linzer Augen, Kokosbusserl, and many homemade cookies.

Baking cookies is a very big deal in Austria during the holiday season. Austrians also eat goose, fish, goulash, and fondue on Christmas day.

On Christmas day, Austrians wake up and dress themselves in nice clothes. then gather around the Christmas tree and sing. Additionally, one thing that many people have become familiar with in recent years is the myth of St. Nicholas and Krampus. It is said that on the evening of December 6, St. Nicholas visits the homes of well-behaved children and rewards them with gifts. In contrast to this pleasant thought, St. Nicholas' companion, Krampus, is said to visit the homes of ill-behaved children to kidnap and punish them. Many young people dress as Krampus during the holiday season to scare others. If you ever find yourself in Austria on December 6, watch out for Krampus.

France is another country that celebrates Christmas. I asked to sit down with Maeghan, a former resident of France and current student of Alfred-Almond. to discuss the differences in how Christmas is celebrated. "Christmas is not as different as people tend to think. The main differences are some of the foods and festivities. For example, in my town there was always music playing in the streets and there were bouncy houses and trampolines set up everywhere," Maeghan explained. The French tend to be more festive, however if you live in northern France, you usually don't get any snow. Some foods that are eaten during the holiday season in France are Büche de Noël, oysters, patées, truffles,



Pros

- As implied by the name, ★ artificial trees do not have the natural features all appearance, or smell that pine, spruce, or fir do, thus eliminating those allergenic threats.
- \star Many people think that these detract from trees the Christmas spirit, due to their usual small, flimsy stature, but it's quite the contrary. These trees can be manufactured to any size needed. fitting even the largest of homes!
- ★ Additionally, numerous ornaments can hang upon the branches, even larger types.
- \star A lot of money can be saved. Instead of having to spend an annual \$50, you can spend \$100 on just one occasion to last a lifetime! "I think we've had three Christmas trees in the past 18 years." (Shawn C.)
- \star You don't have to constantly worry about remembering to water the tree- all you have to do is plug it in and voila - it works!
- These trees can do a LOT of \star funky things. They can be built to spin, have lights, or be a different color. "The lights are really abundant... it's not just around, around, around... it's lit from the inside out." (Shawn C.)


- Depending on what type of artificial tree you buy, the plastic inside could be toxic. Instead of choosing what may look the coolest, you may have to buy a different tree to preserve family health.
- Assembly required. This means having to take the tree out of the box, build it, and when the time comes, tear it down again. This could be a slight hassle, especially if you have a hard time fitting the tree back into the box.

- The tree is not biodegradable, meaning that if you threw the tree away, the environment would not be able to easily decompose This it. is extremely different from real trees, which can be easily thrown, or planted, back into the world.
- Doesn't have the traditional evergreen smell we all know and love.

Now here's some information on a more "traditional" type of tree: real. Be sure to look into the different types of natural trees as well so you can figure out the overall best option for yourself and your family.

Now if you choose to get a real tree, there are some prominent sub categories you need to know about.

Spruce: Needles are extremely sharp, and short. Bark is typically pretty rough, and will get pretty scaly as they age. This breed grows particularly well in the East, since there is nice, rich soil here. Blue spruce is particularly popular since it is symmetrically shaped and has a blue nice. foliage. Fir: Have short, soft needles that typically don't hurt if you're prodded with them. They usually come in a darker green shade, but color still varies. These trees grow well in coastal regions, and are typically found on sea level. One frequent breed is the balsam fir due to its dark green undertones and its classic evergreen scent. **Pine**: The needles are long, soft, and weak. Needles can also be produced in bundles, rather than just one in a spot. Bark is typically a red and brown blended color, and is tough. However, branches are not as stiff as

other types of trees, which can make

hanging heavier ornaments difficult.

Pros

- ★ Many real trees are sturdy, so that almost all decorations can be hung upon them.
- ★ There are many small businesses that sell Christmas trees throughout the world. Buying locally sold, organic trees supports your community against big business.
- ★ Organic trees are biodegradable, meaning that they can be disposed of easily with little to no concern.
- ★ Real trees also come with that beautiful Christmas scent, and fill your home with it for the entire season. "I love the smell, the touch... There's a huge difference between a real tree and an artificial tree and I just like the fact that it's real, that it's alive." (Gina M.)
- ★ Some trees come potted when you buy them. If so, you can replant them whenever possible after the Christmas season passes!

Pine(con't): These trees are typically grown from the midwest to the east states. The popularity varies for these trees depending on what region they're in. For example, the Virginia Pine is really popular in the South, but the Scots Pine is commonly found in Michigan.

Cons

- □ Easy fire hazard, so make sure you're extremely careful around it.
- Pine needles frequently fall, and will really hurt if you step on them. So, you'll have to constantly vacuum the area around the tree to prevent this nuisance.
- Have to be watered to supply them with the correct nutrients needed for survival. If you forget too often, the tree will wilt and could die prematurely.
- □ Takes a large effort to get them set up with lights and the stand, as their weight makes them easily tip over. " "When they are lopsided, hence weighted too much on side, and they fall over." (Gina M.)
- People can be allergic to real trees.
- Pets can be easily drawn to them, and sometimes will excrete on or eat the tree.




