


The Snow Ball



More Than Just A Dream

Martin Luther King Jr. was rights American civil advocate primarily during the 1950s and 60s. In the year 2018, Martin Luther King Jr. Day will be on Monday, January 15. This holiday celebrates Dr. King's healing that he brought to America through his power of courage, justice, compassion, and dignity. His words were inspiring to many people all over America, so on this holiday we commemorate everything he has taught us. While preaching his thoughts on equality through his speeches, Dr. King used peaceful protest and believed violence was never the answer.

On August 28, 1963, Martin Luther King Jr. gave his "I Have a Dream" speech to a group of nearly 250,000 civil rights protesters in Washington D.C. Not only did Dr. King intend to influence thousands of marchers surrounding the Lincoln memorial, but also the Federal Government to take on a larger role white fighting for racial equality.

Martin Luther King Jr. and his "I Have a Dream" speech have provided an even broader application to Americans than we think. References to the speech are present in many songs and even movies. The song "One Vision," by Queen, includes positive verses and a hope for unity. Freddie Mercury sings "Look what they've done to my dream," as the guitar plays, referring to the hope for unity among the country. The song "We Shall Overcome," by Bruce Springsteen, could be applied to most instances of oppression within the country during the civil rights movement. The song gains instrumental momentum to relate to the encouraging spirit of Martin Luther King Ir.

In Ms. Backer's ninth grade English class here at Alfred-Almond, students are currently studying rhetoric and creating their own speeches. "I Have a Dream" was not entirely written by Dr. King alone, his advisers Stanley Levison and Clarence Jones wrote the first draft of the speech, while the final draft came together with the input of many others. Ms. Backer's students read and analyze the speech in order to write their own speeches with the rhetoric they learned. In Mrs. Kress's AP English class, they read and analyzed "A Letter From Birmingham Jail." The students reflect on the power of speech and the speech structure. On the fifteenth of January this year, students will have the day off of school to commemorate Martin Luther King Jr.



Fancy Flowers

The Rose Parade is a festival of flowers, music, and sports. It takes place every January 1 as a New Year's celebration in Pasadena, California. This year is the 129th anniversary of the parade. It began as a promotion for Pasadena's Valley Hunt Club during the winter of 1890. Members of the club invited the East Coast to a midwinter celebration. "In New York, people are buried in snow. Here our flowers are blooming and our oranges are about to bear. Let's hold a festival to tell the world about our paradise," professor Charles F. Holder said during a club meeting. The Valley Hunt Club invited the East Coast across the country to watch games including chariot races, jousting, foot races, polo, and tug of war. Over the next few years, more and more was added to the festival, including marching bands, motorized floats, ostrich races. bronco busting demonstrations, and a race between a camel and an elephant. In 1895, after the festival had become too much for Valley Hunt Club to handle, the Tournament of Roses Association was formed to take their place.

The Tournament of Roses takes about 80,000 hours of volunteer work and 935 members of the non-profit Tournament of Roses Association. Each year there is a new parade theme, which the float ideas are based on 2017's theme was "Find Your Adventure," and 2018's theme is "Making a Difference." Every year there are 24 trophies and awards given to floats that are within certain categories and specifications. The highest award is the Sweepstakes award; it is given to the most beautiful

entry encompassing float design, floral presentation, and entertainment. There are nine awards that incorporate floral presentation, ten under float design, and four based on entertainment value. Each year there is a royal court that includes one Rose Queen and six princesses. The 100th Rose Queen and royal court will be on the last float of the 2018 parade.

Every year, 22 marching bands are chosen from around the world to perform at the Rose Parade. Two of the marching bands are from the schools competing in the Rose Bowl; the other 20 are chosen based on musicianship, marching ability, and entertainment/special value. A majority of the marching bands selected are those from American high schools. The others come from around the world; one band from Australia is called Australia's

Marching Koalas.

The Rose Parade is followed by the Rose Bowl Game, which features the College Football Playoff Semifinal, and is held at 1 p.m. after the parade concludes. The game is held at the Rose Bowl Stadium, and has been since 1921, when the stadium was built. This year, the stadium welcomed the Oklahoma Sooners and the Georgia Bulldogs. Last year, the game got 35.6 million people to tune in, and the number of viewers increases each year.

The Rose Parade is a New Year's celebration of flowers, music, and sports. People all across the world tune in on January 1 to watch the beautiful parade and listen to some music, then continue watching to see who comes out on top at the semifinals of the College Football Playoffs. Viewers tuned in to ABC, NBC, HGTV, or Hallmark Channel at 8 a.m. on January 1 to watch the Rose Parade and ESPN at 5 p.m. to watch the Rose Bowl.


Charleston

Net Neutrality: A Rundown

It seems that nowadays, the Internet is more important than ever. Virtually all Americans use it for some purpose; specifically here at Alfred-Almond, we rely on it for homework delivery and submission. There's a good chance that you're reading this very article online. Since the Internet is so important to our daily lives, it would only make sense we should all be aware of the behind-the-scenes portion of it that our lawmakers are responsible for, and the way it's being delivered to us.

We get access to the Internet by paying Internet services providers, or ISPs, for access to their lines. Oftentimes in America, they will also offer access to cable television and telephone service. In Allegany County, the most prominent ISPs are Spectrum, previously known as Time Warner Cable, and Frontier. Both of these companies are very large, in fact the 2nd and 8th largest ISPs in America, respectively. As of right now, the price we pay is based on the speed of our service, so if you want to send or receive information quicker, you pay more.

ISPs, like all other companies in America, are regulated by a government agency, and must follow the rules these agencies set. ISPs are specifically regulated by the Federal Communications Commission, or FCC, which is controlled by five commissioners who are appointed by the president. Recently, the FCC has passed a vote to eliminate certain regulations on ISPs. These regulations are based on a Title II classification, and were instated in 2015 by the FCC's Open Internet Order. When ISPs were under this classification, they were considered "common carriers," and as such, were subject to rules similar to landline phone and electricity providers. The whole reason for this classification was to give the FCC more power in maintaining a policy: net neutrality.

The general concept of net neutrality is that ISPs must treat all data transmitted over the Internet with the same priority. They cannot intentionally censor data they don't like. They can't throttle, or slow down, data either. Conversely, they can't prioritize data and give certain incentives for accessing certain websites. ISPs have a motive for not treating data neutrally because of their participation in the media industry. Comcast, America's largest ISP, owns NBCUniversal, and would prefer you visit NBC's website over CNN's. Without net neutrality, they would also have the power to fulfill political motives and selectively censor certain opinions or material. Additionally, they would be able to block access to certain sites and services unless the customer pays a premium. This concept of neutrality applies to other Title II services such as electricity. Power companies charge you for general access to electricity and can't control which appliances you use it for.

Protections in favor of net neutrality have been present much before the Open Internet Order of 2015. In 2005, FCC chairman Michael Powell declared the FCC would enforce four main freedoms on the Internet: The freedom to access content, use applications, attach personal devices, and obtain service plan information. At this point, their authority to regulate the Internet was derived from Title I classification, which gave the FCC less to work with than Title II, but nonetheless they had the power to fine North Carolina ISP Madison River for blocking voice-chat program Vonage. But this recent vote has proven that the motives of the FCC have changed. Before the reclassification of the Internet as

Title II in 2015, the FCC was vigilant in keeping ISPs in check; after the reclassification, it was nearly impossible for ISPs to not act neutrally, although they still made attempts. But the vote, along with scrapping Title II classification, also specifically repealed laws enforcing net neutrality, and the current FCC has made it clear that their intention is to let the ISPs do as they please.

Part of America's need for regulation of ISPs comes from the lack of competition present in most of the country. Locally, we only have one cable provider, Spectrum; one DSL provider, Frontier; and if necessary, satellite Internet provider Dish. This is average for America. In a European country like the United Kingdom, the average number of providers is significantly higher, thanks to legislation they enforce. The key difference is ownership of the lines. Here in America, companies like Comcast tend to make it very difficult - illegal in some cases - for competition to establish itself, by means of lawsuits and lobbying, and most of the time maintain monopolies. They won't let competitors put up their own lines without a fight, and sharing existing lines is out of the question. This is why Google Fiber was a failure: every city it arrived in required a legal battle with existing ISPs. But in many countries in Europe and Asia, things are handled the complete opposite way.


Not only do ISPs not even try to force out others through legal battles, they are also required to share the last mile of the infrastructure they build with other ISPs. That way, if one ISP does something unsavory like limiting the amount of data you can use per month or blocking or throttling websites, you can just choose another one. This is referred to as local loop unbundling and is highly unlikely to become reality under the current FCC, so the next best option is making the ISPs we have behave themselves.

THE MAN IN CONTROL

Our current FCC chairman, Ajit Pai, was previously a lawyer for Verizon and was appointed to commissioner by Barack Obama during his time as president after being recommended by Mitch McConnell. Once Donald Trump became president, Pai was designated as chairman. He takes an anti-net neutrality stance and was one of the three commissioners who voted for its repeal in December.

Rohingya Refugees



On August 25, 2017, there was an outburst of violence in the Southeast Asian country of Myanmar. According to BBC.com, the violence started with an attack on police by **Rohingya** militants. Since the attacks, thousands of Rohingya have fled Myanmar. The Washington Post reports that Burmese troops and Buddhist mobs have been attacking the Rohingya, committing systematic rape, and burning and looting their villages, as a response to the

The Rohingya are a mostly Muslim ethnic group that have been long persecuted in Myanmar. They are a minority in the state of Rakhine and that has created tensions between them and the Buddhists also living there, according to the BBC. The country does not recognize the Rohingya as citizens. Instead, the government refers to them as "Bengali" which means that they are considered illegal immigrants from the country of Bangladesh, reports the Washington Post. Bangladesh does not recognize the Rohingya as citizens either, leaving the minority group stateless.

NPR reports that during the first month of the attacks, 6,700 Rohingya were killed The Myanmar government's official death count for the same time period is 400 people. The government has also denied all accusations of ethnic cleansing, which mounting have been as more information has been received. According to the BBC, the UN human rights chief said that genocide could not be ruled out. Nearly 650,000 Rohingya have fled Myanmar since August, most of them going to Bangladesh, reports the UN Refugee Agency.

The UN called for investigation into Rohingya persecution about a year ago. Since then, they have called for an end to the violence, but have not imposed sanctions on Myanmar, reported the BBC. The UN Refugee Agency has distributed warmer clothes and supplies to improve the shelters of the refugees now living in Bangladesh. On November 23, Bangladesh and Myanmar signed an agreement to allow for the return of Rohingya refugees to Myanmar, reported CNN. Only time will tell whether the Rohingya will return to Myanmar.



Here is a list of the essential equipment you need to take care of your very own guinea pig!

- A cage with the dimensions of 30" x 50" for every two guinea pigs you obtain.
- A water bottle or water dish.
- Food dish and/or tray.
- Food pellets that are branded for pigs; they can't generate Vitamin C so they need some food source to provide it to them.
- Hay so that your little pet can digest food easily.
- Store bought apple tree branch treats or branches from an apple tree that has no pesticides on it. Guinea pigs' teeth never stop growing, and they need something to chew on to wear them down.
- Cage bedding, either wood shavings or cloth.
 Many kinds of wood shavings irritate guinea pigs' skin, so make sure you check if its okay before you buy it. The safest type to buy is aspen.
- Many leafy greens for treats.
- A brush pan, garbage bags, and many paper towels to clean the cage with.
- A plastic castle or cloth building so that your guinea pig can hide. As animals of prey they love to scuttle away!
- Some tunnels or treat balls for them to experiment with.


- While it is proven that the government tests new types of planes and weapons at this facility, Area 51 is still




Illuminati - Illuminati Conspiracy


