

First Honor Roll Breakfast recognizes academic achievement

Once again, the Secondary School Improvement Team was proud to host the First Honor Roll Breakfast for the first quarter of the 2018-19 school year. On Thursday, December 6, the High School cafeteria was at capacity seating with students and families gathered to enjoy fruit, juice and the ever-popular donuts, along with recognition.

The academic achievements of the students were celebrated as Mrs. Bain-Lucey offered her gratitude and admiration for the importance they have placed on their education, along with their commitment to improve, grow, learn and challenge themselves. She thanked the parents and teachers for their support and encouragement of the students.

One hundred fifteen First Honor students were recognized by their counselors, comprising 41 percent of the student body. In order to receive First Honors, a student must obtain an average of 90 percent or higher and have no

grade below 80 percent. Mrs. Bain-Lucey also recognized the 184 students who achieved either first or second honor status or BOCES honors. This comprised 65 percent of the Alfred-Almond Jr. Sr. High School student body.

STAR credit information

Fligible new homeowners will receive their STAR savings in the form of a check directly from New York State. New Basic and En-



hanced STAR applicants must register with the New York State Tax Department to receive a STAR check. Register anytime at <u>www.tax.ny.gov/star</u> or by phone weekdays from 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. (518-457-2036). Register by July 1 to receive your STAR check in September. If you register after July 1, you will receive your check later.

STAR eligibility requirements

If you own your home, it's your primary residence, and if your income is \$500,000 or less, you're eligible for the Basic STAR credit.

If you're 65 or older with an income of \$86,000 or less, you may be eligible for the Enhanced STAR credit.

Before you register

You'll need this information to register for the STAR credit:

- names and social security numbers for all owners of the property and their spouses
- the primary residence of the owners and their spouses
- approximate date the owners purchased the property and the name of the sellers
- 2018 school tax bill, if the current owners received one
- address of any residential property owned in an other state
- the legal name of the trust, if applicable
- 2017 federal or state income tax returns for all owners. If you weren't required to file a 2017 income tax return, you be asked to provide financial information for all property owners.

STAR exemption recipients

You don't need to register with New York State for STAR if you're a longtime homeowner with an existing STAR exemption. If you're a senior citizen who has been receiving the Basic STAR exemption and has become eligible for the Enhanced STAR exemption, you should apply with your local assessor.

In order to identify all children who will enter Kindergarten in September 2019, we are asking those parents who have eligible children who **DO NOT CURRENTLY ATTEND THE PRE-K PROGRAM** to complete this form and return it to the elementary school by April 20, 2019. Your child must be 5 years of age on or before December 1, 2019. This information is necessary when we initiate Kindergarten sign-ups in the spring. We will use this information below to generate a mailing list for sending the actual registration packets. Students currently attending the Pre-K will automatically be sent a packet. Your cooperation is greatly appreciated. Thank you.

The AACS library staff, computer technology department and High School art department invite all teachers, staff, students and district residents to join our Literacy Celebration Poster Project for 2018-19.



- 3. Allow us to photograph you holding a copy of your special book.


Submissions will be used by fine arts and computer students to create posters celebrating the power of individual reading habits to shape lives, and encouraging increased individual reading by members of this community.
