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### A message from the Superintendent

Dear Alfred-Almond Central School District Community Members,

I want to provide you with a quick overview of what has been going on at Alfred-Almond in the "building department." So many great upgrades and renovations have been completed/planned for the future and I want to ensure that everyone is up-to-date and fully informed.

Our district has a strong history of providing quality programs and facilities for our children as well as maintaining the historic integrity of our campus. On May 21, district residents

will vote on a *no additional tax impact* capital project. The project is another step toward enhancing our buildings and programs for current and future students by focusing on safety and security improvements and the replacement of aging infrastructure items.

In an effort to protect our past investments, the district and the Board of Education worked hard to develop a plan. The work began with the Building Condition Survey,

as required by the New York State Department of Education to ensure school districts are planning for and maintaining their facilities. This plan outlines a scope of work which, among other things, replaces items giving way to years of normal wear and tear. The proposal includes


hot water heater replacements, unit ventilator replacements, partial roof replacements, electrical upgrades, a new emergency generator, locker room renovations and asphalt and sidewalk restorations.

and auditorium. Auditorium renovations include improvements to the doors, seating, flooring, lobby and an HVAC system that will make you even more eager to see the next school musical or student performance. In addition, the bus garage will be restored and brought up to 2019 code with drainage upgrades, door, window and overhead door replacements and HVAC and fire alarm upgrades. The roof in the elementary wing will also be replaced, as it is at the end of its 20-year warranty and is starting to show its age.

The remainder of the project includes program-related items such as classroom renovations and updates. A minimum of one elementary, one middle school and one high school classroom will be renovated into a state-of-the-art STEM learn-

ing center. These upgrades are especially exciting, as they provide great learning environments for our students. It is intended that these classroom renovations will serve as a basis for future enhancements and that the entire project will improve the overall educational experience for our current and future generations of children.

Additionally, to further improve and modernize our facilities, the district has selected Day Automation to implement an Energy Performance Contract (EPC) to include state-funded energy saving building improvements. An EPC enables a school district to cover the costs of energy efficiency upgrades over time using the savings generated by these upgrades. The upgrades will include conversion of lighting to LED technology with daylight harvesting and dimming capabilities, improved insulation and sealing, automated

electronic controls and several mechanical system upgrades. The savings generated are guaranteed by Day Automation during the life of the Energy Performance Contract. In short, if the savings at the end of the year are not what was promised in our contract, the firm is legally bound to pay Alfred-Almond the difference in cash. This vote authorization will qualify the project for an additional 10 percent of building aid to further enhance the financial benefit of this energy saving project. Voters may remember that we completed a similar project in the 2002 school year with great benefit and success.

The capital project will cost \$3,800,000 and will not require any additional taxes on the part of our community. More than 80 percent of the project will be funded by New York State Aid, with the rest coming from our capital reserves. Just as we have done with past projects, the local share will be covered by monies that we saved over time in preparation for this needed work.

At Alfred-Almond Central School District, we strive to improve our facilities to ensure the safety and security of our students and staff, while at the same time being mindful of the need to be fiscally responsible. During these renovations, we greatly value the heritage and history of our buildings and aim to uphold their visual integrity. We believe you will find that the proposed project will improve our school district and positively impact our community as a whole.

As we get closer to the May vote, we will provide you with a more detailed explanation of the proposed work, as well as the established funding structure which will allow it to be completed with no impact to taxes.

#### Universal Pre-K Info.

dministration anticipates that the Universal Pre-Kindergarten (UPK) program for our preschool children will continue into the 2019-20 school year. Children born on or before December 1, 2015 are eligible to apply for attendance in the program. Children who are eligible to attend kindergarten are not eligible to apply for attendance in UPK.

The application is included in this newsletter and will be available at the Elementary Office and on the district website at <a href="https://www.aacs.wnyric.org">www.aacs.wnyric.org</a>. If you would like to receive an application in the mail, please contact Heidi Putnam at 607-276-6530. Completed applications and a copy of your child's birth certificate, current physical and immunization records are due at the Elementary Office no later than Wednesday, May 1.

Applications received after this date will not be considered if more than 18 applications are received. A random selection process, as required by New York State, will be performed should the district receive more applications than the 18 available openings. Families will be notified whether their child did or did not receive a spot in the UPK program by letters that will be mailed on Monday, May 6.

# Kindergarten visitation and registration scheduled

Children born on or before December 1, 2014 are eligible to enter school in September 2019.

Parents and their children are invited to attend kindergarten visitation on May 8 at 2:30 p.m. This visitation is open to all children who will be eligible to enter school in September 2019.

Kindergarten registration will be held by appointment only on May 14-17 from 8:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. When registering your child, you will need to bring:

- 1. Child's birth certificate or other legal record of child's birth date. Children must be five years of age on or before December 1, 2018.
- 2. Your child's immunization record (see list below). According to law, your child may NOT enter school without proof of these immunizations.
- 3. Current physical.
- 4. An end-of-the-year checklist from any nursery school your child may have attended.

If your child is eligible to attend kindergarten in September 2019, please call the Elementary Office at 276-6525 to confirm mailing information to register your child.
