Universal Pre-K enrollment

dministration anticipates that the Universal Pre-Kindergarten (UPK) program for our preschool children will continue into the 2025-26 school year. Children born on or before December 1, 2021 are eligible to apply for attendance in the program. Children who are eligible to attend kindergarten are not eligible to apply for attendance in UPK.

The UPK application is included in this newsletter and also will be available at the Elementary Office and on the district website at www.aacsapps.com. If you wish to receive an application in the mail, please contact Nicole VanNorman at 607-276-6530 or email nvannorman@aacsapps.com. Completed applications, a copy of your child's birth certificate and current physical and immunization records are due at the Elementary Office no later than Wednesday, May 9. Applications received after this date will not be considered if more than 18 applications are received.

A random selection process, as required by New York State, will be performed should the district receive more applications than the 18 available openings. Families will be notified whether their child did or did not receive a spot in the UPK program by letters that will be mailed on Monday, May 12. Seniors gain new privilege

In February 3, the Secondary School implemented a new privilege for senior students. Seniors will now have the option of choosing late arrival or early dismissal in their schedule. This would allow a senior to opt out of a study hall for 1st Mod or 8th Mod. Late arrival would allow a senior student to come in to school at 9:23 a.m. Early dismissal would allow a senior student to leave after 7th mod at 2:11 p.m.

To maintain this privilege, students must adhere to following qualifications throughout the school year:

- 1. The senior must maintain at least 2nd honor status;
- 2. The senor cannot be chronically absent (more than 10% of school days);
- 3. The senior cannot be late to school more than three instances;
- 4. The senior may not appear on the blue list;
- 5. The senior may not be in violation of the code of conduct.

As seniors are fast approaching their futures in higher education and/or the workforce, we want to reward students who have maintained a high level of excellence and responsibility.

Seniors for the 2025-26 school year will have this year's quarter 4 grades and attendance utilized to grant privileges for the start of the school year.
