Universal Pre-K Information

dministration anticipates that the Universal Pre-Kindergarten (UPK) program for our preschool children will continue into the 2024-25 school year. Children born on or before December 1, 2020, are eligible to apply for attendance in the program. Children who are eligible to attend kindergarten are not eligible to apply for attendance in UPK.

The application is included on page 4 in this newsletter and also will be available at the elementary office and on the district website at www.aacsapps.com. If you would like to receive an application in the mail, please contact Heidi Putnam by calling 607-276-6530 or emailing hputnam@aacsapps.com.

Completed applications and a copy of your child's birth certificate, current physical and immunization records must be returned to the elementary school office no later than Wednesday, May 8.

Applications received after this date will not be considered if more than 18 applications are received. A random selection process, as required by New York State, will be performed should the district receive more applications than the 18 available openings. Families will be notified in writing whether their child did or did not receive a spot in the UPK program. Letters that will be mailed on Monday, May 13.

Elementary STEM club

This year, the elementary STEM club offered third- and fourth-grade students a chance to learn all about STEM and dive into some fun and challenging projects. In October, students were able to design a haunted house using only a few materials that were provided for them. In November, students read the book *Balloons Over Broadway* then designed, created and flew a balloon in their own Alfred-Almond Thanksgiving Day parade. In December, students were given craft sticks, tape, tinsel and tree ornaments to design and create their own antler ears and then held a reindeer race to see whose antlers stood up to all the reindeer games.

For our final January meeting, students listened to the story *Snowmen at Work*. They made snow from baking

soda and conditioner. Then, they were tasked with the problem of building a shovel using one piece of paper, four straws, three feet of tape and four craft sticks. The shovel had to be able to pick up as much snow as possible without breaking.

We had a great time and students were engaged and learning a lot about the engineer-



ing and design process. Fifth and six grade students will be starting a STEM club in February.


